Key dates in Stonnington’s history

1835	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Settlement of Melbourne began
1836	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Gardiner, Hawdon and Hepburn took up a pastoral run, Gardiners Creek Station
1837	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The first survey of Melbourne established the eastern boundary of Melbourne as Punt Road, surveyed an Aboriginal reserve, and established parishes, naming Prahran • George Langhorne established an Aboriginal Mission – boundaries Punt Road, Yarra River, High Street and Williams Road • John Gardiner built a house just north of the junction of the Yarra River and Kooyong Koot Creek (later known as Gardiners Creek)
1838	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First punt over the Yarra established at Swanston Street
1839	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Christmas eve flood destroyed brickyard settlement south of the Yarra River
1840	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First Crown land sales in the district: 22 lots between Yarra River/Gardiners Creek and Toorak Road • Solicitor Peter Ferrie purchased Crown Portion 21, 60 acres later known as Glenferrie, bounded by Toorak, Avenel and Glenferrie Roads and Gardiners Creek • James McAlpine born, thought to be the first white child born in the Gardiner district
1845	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First wooden bridge over the Yarra at Swanston Street (Balbirnie’s Bridge)
1846	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Victoria Tannery established on the river, near Yarra Street
1847	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Construction of <i>Como House</i> begun
1848	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Avoca</i> built, <i>Toorak House</i> begun
1849	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Crown land sales of land between Toorak and Commercial/Malvern Roads • Yarra floods
1850	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Crown land sales in Prahran and Windsor (Commercial/Malvern Road to Dandenong Road) • First stone bridge built over the Yarra at Swanston Street • Brickmakers established near Chapel Street
1851	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Independent Chapel built in Chapel Street (demolished c. 1883) • Separation of Victoria from New South Wales • Victorian gold rush • Hawksburn House built in South Yarra on 52 acres for James Cassell
1853	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Madame Latour’s school opened in Prahran near corner of Chapel and High Streets • First purpose-built hotel in Prahran, the South Yarra Inn, opened on the corner of Punt and Toorak Roads. The current building on this site dates from 1892 • First Church of England service in Prahran held in a rented cottage in Chapel Street • Mt Erica Hotel opened in a bush setting, corner of Williams Road and High Street (rebuilt 1877). An adjacent vacant paddock was used for horse racing until 1865
1854	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Crown land sales in Gardiner Township

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prahran declared a Road District and boundaries defined • First school commenced in Gardiner District – a four-roomed cottage in Malvern Road, not far from Elizabeth Street • Church of England School House opened in Chapel Street, serving also as a church • <i>Toorak House</i> became the Governor’s residence; Toorak began to replace Fitzroy as the most fashionable district • In Gardiner, the Malvern Hill Hotel opened on the corner of Glenferrie and Malvern Road, the oldest hotel in Malvern, and the first recorded use locally of the name • Notley’s Hotel opened in Toorak Village • Central Board of Health established • Prahran Mechanics’ Institute established in Chapel Street, near Greville Street
1855	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Municipality of Prahran declared • First use of the name Malvern to refer to the district of Gardiner • South Yarra Waterworks established a stand pipe at the corner of Chapel Street and Toorak Road
1856	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First Prahran council elected; Council met in the Mechanics’ Institute • First meeting of the Gardiner District Road Board at Wattle Tree Hotel. The boundaries of this first District later became the boundaries of Malvern municipality • First road works started by the Gardiner Road Board – the construction of Malvern Hill Road (later called Hopetoun Road) • New Prahran Court House opened • Prahran volunteer fire brigade formed • Yan Yean reservoir built
1857	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First Church Street bridge opened • Government grant obtained for the construction of a school in Glenferrie Road for the Anglican Church • <i>Prahran and St Kilda Advertiser</i> published – first known local newspaper
1858	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First Yan Yean water supplied to a stand pipe at corner of Chapel Street and Toorak Road • Holy Trinity Church built at the corner of Dandenong and Warrigal Roads, the first purpose-built church in the former City of Malvern (still standing, known as Liddiard Hall) • Fire brigade building in Greville Street and wooden fire tower built. • Victoria Brewery opened in Chapel Street, later redeveloped as a Jam Factory • <i>St Kilda Chronicle</i> began publication
1859	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First railway connecting Chapel Street (Windsor) from St Kilda to Brighton • Independent Church built in Malvern Road – now Chapel-off-Chapel. It replaced the much smaller church in Chapel Street • South Yarra and Prahran Rifle Corps formed
1860	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Construction of Prahran Town Hall commenced • South Yarra railway line opened, South Yarra and Prahran stations opened. • <i>Prahran Telegraph</i> thought to have commenced publication (earliest extant copies date from 1866) • First school for deaf people opened in Peel Street, Windsor; founded by Frederick Rose, a builder • First general store in Glenferrie Road opened on the south west corner of

	<p>Wattletree Road</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Henry Cawkwell established a large tile and terracotta works on High Street (corner Cawkwell Street). Demolished in the 1920s
1861	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Prahran Town Hall completed Free library set up in Prahran Town Hall Gas street lighting introduced in Prahran Yarra in flood Mavern Hill Water-Cure Establishment opened
1862	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> St Kilda-Windsor railway closed Victoria's first bowling green set up at the Gardiner Hotel, corner Dandenong and Glenferrie Roads
1864	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> First toll house erected on Scotchman's Creek Road (later known as Waverley Road) by the Gardiner District Road Board
1865	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Prahran Racing Club's first race meeting at Fawkner Park Prahran Bowling Club established, based in Izett Street Prahran chapter of the Independent Order of Rechabites established: Perseverance Tent No. 34
1867	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Mandeville Hall built (now Loretto College)
1868	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Prahran (open air) market opened in Grattan Street Alfred Hospital opened
1869	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Prahran Court House (cnr Chapel and Greville Streets) pulled down and materials used for new Court House behind Town Hall First water pipe supplied water to a part of Gardiner District from the Yan Yean Reservoir, a five inch pipe along Toorak Road from Kooyong to Glenferrie Road
1870	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Prahran declared a Town
1871	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Gardiner Road Board became the Gardiner Shire Council Prahran Council took over the Prahran Fire Brigade First Rechabite hall in Prahran built in Chapel Street, near south corner of Grey Street (Perseverance Tent No. 34)
1872	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Street watering introduced to Toorak Road, High and Chapel Streets First telegram received in Prahran Post Office Open drain built to drain the South Yarra swamp Twickenham Ferry started, running from Survey Paddock Richmond to Grange Road Toorak. Replaced by the MacRobertson Bridge in 1934 Education Act passed for compulsory, secular and free education
1874	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Presentation Sisters established a parish primary school and girls secondary school in Dandenong Road, St Kilda
1875	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Spring Road State School opened in a new two-roomed brick building – Malvern's oldest surviving school Presentation Sisters moved to <i>Turret Lodge</i> on Dandenong Road, Windsor Armadale House built for James Munro (since 1977, King David School) Governor leaves <i>Como</i> and moves to Government House in the Domain
1876	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Victoria Brewery buildings bought by Henry Jones for Australasian Jam Company (now the Jam Factory in Chapel Street)
1877	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Windsor State School opened in Hornby Street South Yarra and Toorak attempted to secede from Prahran

1878	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Gardiner renamed Malvern • South Yarra-Windsor railway sold to the government • Prahran Town Hall extensions along Greville Street for post office and police station on ground floor and library on first floor • St Matthew's Church of England opens in High Street Prahran • Hawksburn State School opened
1879	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prahran becomes a City • Toorak, Armadale and Malvern railway stations open on the new Oakleigh line. • <i>Prahran Chronicle</i> begins publication
1881	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prahran Market moved from Grattan Gardens to the present site • First public lighting by gas in Malvern: 12 gas lamps costing £8 per year • First planting of street trees in Malvern
1883	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Salvation Army commenced operations in Victoria Street, Prahran (the first purpose-built Salvation Army building in Australia) • Convent of the Good Shepherd (convent and reformatory school) built in Dandenong Road, next door to Chadstone cottage • Try Boys Society established by William Forster in his house in South Yarra
1884	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Armadale State School opened • First asphalt footpath laid in Malvern
1885	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hon Alfred Deakin lays the foundation stone of the Malvern Town Hall, 14 years after the municipality was declared • Elizabeth Fry Retreat opened in South Yarra, founded by the Swinborn family. It ran until 1977 • Victoria Gardens, Toorak Park and Grattan Gardens officially opened on the same day
1886	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Official opening of the Malvern Town Hall • Land adjacent to Spring Road School declared a recreation reserve (now Malvern Gardens)
1887	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Try Society begins operating from the Cromwell Crescent site (closed 1977)
1888	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Land boom in Melbourne • The Town Hall Estate (diagonally opposite the Malvern Town Hall) was sold by auctioneers Munro and Baillieu • New Court House and Police Station opened cnr Macquarie and Greville Streets • Prahran Town Hall renovated to use the old Court House as Council Chambers • Prahran divided into four wards • Prahran State School in High Street opened • Prahran Bowling Club reformed on Council land in Grattan Gardens • Cable tram along Chapel Street opened • Malvern Gardens laid out by Thomas Pockett • Construction of Methodist Church in Spring Road • St Joseph's Church opened in South Yarra
1889	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Land boom continued • Cable tram in Toorak Road from Chapel Street to Irving Road opened • Hawksburn railway station opened • Fire tower built in Macquarie Street (decommissioned c. 1900) • Foundation stone laid for St Joseph's Catholic Church in Stanhope Street, Malvern • <i>Northbrook</i> built for Donald Munro, auctioneer and Malvern Councillor (1891-

	<p>1903)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Rechabite Hall built in Little Chapel Street
1890	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Electric lighting introduced in Prahran • <i>Stonington</i> mansion in Glenferrie Road built for John Wagner, one of the owners of Cobb & Co. Coaches • Railway line extended from Burnley to Glen Iris • Malvern Gardens officially opened • Additions to the Malvern Town Hall included an extended Glenferrie Road façade, and a second tower to be used as a fire look-out for the station at the rear of the town hall • Toorak State School opened • Outer Circle Railway Line from Oakleigh to Camberwell opened
1891	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Floods after one week of rain in July • Fire Brigades Act established a professional (ie: non-volunteer) fire brigade • Melbourne Golf Club was established in East Malvern with an 18-hole course. (included Hedgeley Dene watercourse. Clubhouse in Turner Street; closed 1907) • Prahran Market building in Commercial Road opened
1892	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Windsor fire station built • Valentines mansion built for John Davies, MLC. Used as a school since 1923, now owned by Caulfield Grammar
1894	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Braille Library founded in former South Yarra Methodist Chapel (cnr Commercial Road and Margaret Street)
1896	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Burnley Ferry commenced operation, crossing the Yarra River between Williams Road, South Yarra, and Burnley Street, Richmond. It ran until 1944. • Herbert Thomson of High Street Armadale manufactured the first Australian steam powered motor car
1898	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Salvation Army leased <i>Belgrave</i> mansion on Dandenong Road for use as a Girls' Industrial Home (relocated to Camberwell in 1912)
1899	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Floods and snow in August • St Anthony's Primary School (for the children of the Parish) opened at the Convent of the Good Shepherd (it closed in 1979)
1900	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Macquarie Street fire tower building decommissioned • Old Age pension introduced in Victoria • Demonstration at Malvern Town Hall to support women's suffrage
1901	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sir George Sydenham Clark became the first Victorian Governor to take up residence at <i>Stonington</i> • Malvern became a Borough in February and a Town in April
1903	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Yarra floods • First Malvern Star bicycle made by Thomas Finnigan at 185 Glenferrie Road, Malvern (in 2013, occupied by Readings Books)
1905	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Melbourne High School – the first state secondary school – established in Melbourne cbd (later moved to South Yarra) • Steam powered bus service ran for seven months (from December) between Prahran railway station and Malvern town hall. Mechanical unreliability prompted a return to horse drawn vehicles
1906	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prahran Pioneers commemorate 50 years of local government • Princes Gardens, Brookville and Rockley Gardens sites purchased by Prahran Council

1907	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • State Parliament passed the Prahran and Malvern Trust Constitution Bill, allowing tramway construction • Land acquired by Malvern Council for Central Park • Foundation stone laid for municipal destructor at Prahran Council's Surrey Road Depot • Prahran Council takes over control of Prahran Market • Yarra floods
1908	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 'Safe' milk distributed to selected infants by the Lady Talbot Milk Institute, set up to supply safe, pasteurised milk to mothers unable to breast feed their babies. Prahran Council allocated £100 to this service in 1909
1909	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Art Gallery opened in Prahran Town Hall • The Commonwealth takes over the old age pension
1910	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • First electric tram in district: High Street from Tooronga Road to Charles Street • Prahran opened, run by the Prahran & Malvern Tramways Trust • Prahran's first cinema, the Lyric Theatre, opened in Chapel Street • Windsor telephone exchange opened • Tooronga Estate (100 acres) purchased by the state government for the Tooronga Closer Settlement Scheme (subdivided 1911)
1911	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Malvern declared a City • Prahran & Malvern Tramways Employees Band formed (now Stonnington City Brass) • High Street tram route extended from Charles Street to Punt Road • Floods in February caused by increase in paving, needing an enlarged main drain in Prahran
1912	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Land acquired by Malvern Council for Hedgeley Dene Gardens
1913	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • New creche built in Princes Street, Prahran • Yarra floods • Prahran Technical School opened • Love & Lewis built a new department store in Chapel Street.
1914	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • High Street tram route extended to Malvern Road, Glen Iris • Prahran Free Lending Library opened • New department store built for Charles Read, corner Chapel Street and Commercial Road (PH9192 ; PH12160) • Colosseum department store in Chapel Street and Prahran City Hall destroyed by fire • World War I commenced; German street names changed in Prahran
1915	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Malvern Road tram route opened, St Kilda Road to Burke Road • Prahran Mechanics' Institute moved into its new building at 140 High Street • Main Drain in Prahran completed • Park Street Infant School opened, part of Malvern Central School in Spring Road • Gardiner State School opened (closed 1992)
1916	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Floods affected the Yarra boatsheds • Gardiner State School redefined as a Central School (classes to year 8)
1917	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Yarra floods • First Victorian infant welfare centre established by Dr Isabella Younger Ross in Richmond
1918	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prahran Children's Library opened

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Braille Library and Hall opened in Commercial Road, Prahran
1919	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Influenza epidemic; Armadale State School used as hospital • 16 houses for war widows built by volunteers at Victory Square, Armadale (demolished in the early 1970s) • <i>Prahran Chronicle</i> ceased publication after 40 years
1920	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • RSL Hall built in High Street, Prahran • Prahran & Malvern Tramways Trust (running 90 trams on 35 route miles) taken over by the Tramways Board • Prahran Council and Malvern Council both introduced a Baby Health Service on makeshift premises • Leggett's Ballroom opened in Greville Street (closed 1976) • 17 acres of land purchased by the Lawn Tennis Association of Victoria, now known as the Kooyong Lawn Tennis Club, once home to the Australian Open
1921	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 35 acres of Como land bought by Prahran Council to form Como Park
1922	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Electrification of railway line through Malvern • First attempts at town planning in Prahran
1923	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Infant Welfare Centre opened in Malvern Road, Prahran • Children's playground opened in Gladstone Gardens • Princes Gardens extended • Yarra floods disrupted construction of new Church Street bridge • Prahran Market extended to the west
1924	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • New Church Street Bridge opened • Electric trams from Toorak to Richmond via Chapel Street opened • East Malvern War Service Estate subdivided land into 78 allotments between Serrell Street and Belgrave Road • Mayor of Malvern opened a begonia show using wireless, the first transmission in Australia • Development by Malvern Council of Hedgeley Dene Gardens, formerly used as quarry and rubbish tip • Children's playground opened in Princes Gardens, including the wading pool
1926	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cable tram routes on Toorak Road and Chapel Street closed • Prahran post office moved from town hall to corner Macquarie and Greville Streets
1927	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Electric trams along Chapel Street started • Malvern municipal swimming pool opened on the site of the present Harold Holt Swim Centre • New municipal wing added to Malvern Town Hall, including council chambers and mayoral rooms
1928	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Melbourne High School relocated to Forrest Hill, South Yarra • Malvern Baby Health Centre opened in Barkly Avenue • Railway line extended from East Malvern to Glen Waverley
1929	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Children's Library moved to old Post Office building, Chapel Street, then to Greville Street • Channel cut in the Yarra River to expedite flood drainage creating Como Island (now Herring Island)
1930	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Prahran Telegraph</i> ceased publication after 70 years
1931	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Stonnington</i> decommissioned as Government House, following the Governor General's relocation from the Domain to Canberra

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prahran's first and only milk pasteurisation plant installed at Cotswald Dairy • 720 unemployed men work on Alexandra Avenue and Como Park • 9 hole golf course laid out on south side of Gardiners Creek
1932	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Golf course extended; Sustenance workers construct new creek bed from Scotchmans Creek to Warrigal Road
1934	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Extreme Yarra floods; large area in vicinity of Gardiners Creek severely flooded and Toorak Road bridge swept away • MacRobertson Bridge completed and Twickenham Ferry closed • 13 hole golf course opened • Robert Menzies elected to the House of Representatives as the Member for Kooyong, a position he held until his retirement as Prime Minister in 1966
1935	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • East Malvern Golf course extended to 18 holes over 110 acres
1937	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Poliomyelitis outbreak • Women permitted to join the Prahran Bowling Club, 72 years after the Club's inception
1938	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Housing Commission of Victoria established • Black Bridge on the Outer Circle Line removed
1944	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Burnley Ferry ceased operation
1946	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prahran Mission established in Chapel Street • Holmesglen Housing Factory established to make prefabricated concrete houses (closed 1980; now part of Holmesglen TAFE)
1951	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Armadale Library opened, 699 High Street
1955	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Centenary celebrations of the establishment of local government in Prahran
1956	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Centenary celebrations of the establishment of local government in Malvern
1957	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Construction of Cabrini Hospital to replace the old St Benedict's hospital • Toorak Teacher's College opened
1959	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Opening of Malvern Library in High Street • Malvern Elderly Citizens Welfare Association (MECWA) established • Armytage family sold Como House to the National Trust
1960	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Chadstone Shopping Centre opened (72 shops, department store and supermarket etc)
1961	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Toorak Library opened in Toorak Village
1962	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Armadale Library moved to 578 Orrong Road
1964	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Chadstone Library opened in Bowen Street • Prahran swimming pool opened
1967	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Horace Petty housing estate in South Yarra completed, comprising 614 flats • Raleigh/De Murska Street housing estate in Windsor completed, comprising 212 flats • South Yarra Library opened in old South Yarra Post Office • Christ College (a Catholic teachers' training college) opened at Kildara College
1968	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Christ College relocated to new buildings at the Convent of the Good Shepherd. Relocated to Fitzroy in 1999, by which time it was part of the Australian Catholic University • Union Street housing estate in Windsor completed, comprising 212 flats
1969	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Opening of Harold Holt Memorial Swimming Pool on original Municipal pool site in High Street, Malvern
1970	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • South Eastern Freeway opened

1973	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Toorak/South Yarra Library opened in Toorak Road, replacing two separate branches • First issue of the <i>Malvern News Sheet</i>
1978	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • New Court House built in Malvern Road; Greville Street court closed
1979	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cr Ann Morrow elected as Malvern's first female mayor
1981	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Children's Library moved from Greville Street to main Prahran Library
1982	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Holmesglen TAFE established
1984	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cr Mary Duffy elected as Prahran's first female mayor
1985	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Urban Forest opened – part of the former outer circle railway line • Convent of the Good Shepherd demolished for car park space at Chadstone Shopping Centre
1988	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Official opening of the final stage of Malvern Valley Golf Course • Substantial additions to Harold Holt Swimming Centre • Premier John Cain opened final section of South Eastern Arterial Road Link • Sun and Moon statues designed by Paul Juraszek installed in Malvern City Square

1990	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dunlop Pavilion and Peverill Park officially opened
1991	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Olive Miller Nursing Home for Malvern Elderly Citizens' Welfare Association [MECWA] opened • Darling Park, Glen Iris Park, T. H. King Pavilion and Glen Iris Wetlands officially opened • The name of Chadstone changed to East Malvern • Chadstone High School closed
1992	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cenotaph moved from Malvern Town Hall corner to Central Park • First performance on the Compton Pipe Organ in the Malvern Town Hall • Gardiner Primary School closed

1994	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Malvern and Prahran Councils amalgamated to form the City of Stonnington. Government appointed three Commissioners to manage Stonnington municipality prior to a new council being elected
