To find out if your pet's microchip details are up-to-date:

- » go to petaddress.com.au
- » enter their microchip number
- » contact the microchip registry your pet is listed with
- » check your contact details are correct

Microchipping FAQs



What is a microchip?

A chip, the size of a rice grain, inserted between the shoulder blades of your feline or canine companion.

What is the purpose of a microchip?

To provide permanent identification of your pet.

When does microchipping occur?

Microchipping of cats and dogs must be done by 3 months of age.

Must an animal be microchipped before registration with Council?

Yes, microchipping is a condition of registration with Council (which is compulsory once your cat or dog is 3 months old).

When must your pet wear a Council-issued tag?

All cats and dogs must wear a Council tag when outside their premises.
