

# Nature Strip Planting Policy



#### CITY OF STONNINGTON NATURE STRIP PLANTING POLICY

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#### Introduction

The City of Stonnington (Council) is committed to creating healthy and inclusive public green spaces throughout the city that support the health and wellbeing of its residents and promote positive environmental outcomes, while maintaining safety and accessibility.

Nature strips are areas of **public land** between the property boundary and the kerb, not including the footpath, kerb or driveways.

Under Council's *General Local Law 2018 (amendment)*, residents are expected to maintain a sightly premises (including nature strips) but must obtain a Permit from Council in order to plant vegetation on or otherwise modify the nature strip immediately outside land which they occupy.

This Nature Strip Planting Policy (Policy) gives effect to what Council will and will not allow in terms of planting and other modifications, outlines Permit conditions and process, and sets out maintenance obligations for Permit-holders.

This Policy is supported by a community-facing document (*Nature Strip Planting Handbook*) and the Permit application process.

#### **Purpose**

The purpose of this Policy is to:

- Outline conditions that residents must adhere to when undertaking nature strip planting and other modifications to conform with public safety, accessibility, and all applicable legislation and regulation.
- Record Council's process relating to approving nature strip planting and other modifications through the introduction of a Permit application process.
- Confirm Council's approach to existing (legacy) nature strip modifications.

#### Scope

This Policy applies to any eligible nature strips within Council's jurisdiction. To be considered 'eligible' under this Policy, the nature strip in question must meet the requirements established in Table 1 below:

Table 1: Criteria for nature strip eligibility under the Policy

Permitted	Excluded	
Nature strips directly in front of, or adjacent to, a residential property, or certain commercial properties.	Nature strips on arterial roads, where applicable.

<ul> <li>Nature strips that already contain gravel, granitic sand, or alternative medium.</li> </ul>	Nature strips that for any reason, pose a high level of risk for planting or other modification.	

Table 1 refers to examples only and is not an exhaustive list of what Council may consider to be 'eligible'. Council will assess each application and reserves full discretion to determine eligibility.

# **Objectives**

The objectives of this Policy are to, in a manner that maintains all applicable public safety and accessibility requirements:

- Create elevated aesthetic value, neighbourhood pride of place, and character.
- Support lower maintenance requirements in terms of mowing and weeding.
- Improve drought tolerance and reduce watering needs.
- Enhance biodiversity outcomes, such as improved habitat quality and connectivity for beneficial insects, pollinators, birds, and other local fauna.
- Improve climate resilience, through reduced urban heat island effect and enhanced flood calming.

The implementation of this Policy aligns with the delivery of the below actions from the following strategic Council documents in Table 2 below.

#### **Principles**

This Policy is guided by the following principles:

- Environmental sustainability.
- Alignment with existing policies, procedures, and practices.
- Safety, accessibility, risk mitigation and inclusivity as per all applicable legislation and regulation.
- Community consultation.

### **Policy**

This Policy in no way mandates a specific course of action nor obliges residents to alter their nature strips from their current state, provided the nature strip is maintained to an adequate level that is compliant with Council's *General Local Law 2018 (amendment)* and all relevant safety and accessibility requirements.

This Policy provides a pathway for Stonnington residents to plant or otherwise modify nature strips in accordance with the purpose, scope, objectives and principles described above should they wish to do so.

#### New nature strip plantings

#### (a) Allowable modifications

Modifications approved by Council under this Policy include plantings that:

- Maintain an overall maximum plant height that does not limit sightlines for pedestrians, cyclists, and vehicles.
- Maintain a Clearance Area around any services.
- Minimise tripping hazards.
- Maintain a pathway for safe passage from the road to the footpath via the nature strip.
- Maintain a distance suitable to avoid blocking street drains and road edges / gutters.
- Maintain an area suitable for waste and recycling receptacle placement.

To support this, the below specific requirements apply:

- Only groundcovers or grasses of a maximum height of 0.5m are to be used within the Clearance Area, being 0.3m from the footpath, kerb, parking signage, and/or power poles or other assets within the nature strip.
- Only groundcovers or grasses of a maximum height of 0.5m are to be used within the Sight Distance Splay of a driveway or other vehicle access point, or within 10m of an intersection, street corner, or roundabout.
- Only groundcovers or grasses of a maximum height of 0.5m are to be used within 0.3m of street trees, and no planting is to be undertaken within the mulched area of newly planted street trees.
- In all other areas of the nature strip, plant species selection must be undertaken with consideration of traffic and pedestrian sightlines and visibility to a maximum height of 0.9m.
- The resident must regularly maintain all vegetation on the nature strip to ensure the above requirements are upheld at all times.

Diagrams illustrating the above Clearance Area, distance, and height requirements are included in the *Nature Strip Planting Handbook.* 

Residents wishing to modify their nature strips in accordance with the above will be required to apply for a Permit via an online self-assessment tool on the Council website. Any Permit issued as a result will contain binding conditions that, if unmet or violated, will render the Permit invalid.

#### (b) Non-allowable modifications

Modifications not approved by Council under this Policy include, but are not limited to:

- Installation of private lighting, irrigation, water tanks.
- Installation of retaining walls.
- Installation of synthetic turf.
- Planter boxes.
- Use of hard landscaping surfaces (e.g., pavers, bricks, fences, etc.)
- Use of fine gravel, granitic sand, etc.

Council may consider Permit applications for nature strip modifications that include the above elements in exceptional circumstances, where there is a significant justification. Such applications will be assessed by Council Officers on a case-by-case basis and not via the self-assessment tool and will take into account environmental and community impacts. Any Permit issued from this process will contain bespoke binding conditions that, if unmet or violated, will render the Permit invalid.

Council continues to reserve each and every one of its rights in relation to the Permit conditions and approvals process and maintains full discretion over what it will and will not Permit in accordance will all applicable legislation and regulation requirements.

#### **Additional mandatory requirements**

Residents who apply for a Permit to modify their nature strips must:

- Complete an assessment of underground assets to ensure that there is no possibility of interference, damage, disturbance to said assets, or risk of injury or harm. This will include providing evidence to Council as part of the Permit application process that:
  - A Before You Dig Australia assessment has been completed and all safety and risk considerations have been thoroughly reviewed and taken into consideration
  - All relevant authorities listed in the Before You Dig Australia assessment have been contacted.
- Employ an abundance of care when digging on nature strips, including:
  - Only utilising hand-held digging tools.
  - Not using any machinery (e.g., augers, power tools etc.) when digging.
- Maintain their nature strip to ensure continued compliance with the above allowable modifications and these additional mandatory requirements, including through weeding, pruning and removal of debris.
- Consult with neighbours, meaning that:
  - Upon submission of a Permit application, Council shall issue the resident with a notice of intended works, to be placed in a visible location outside the property for a minimum period of no less than two calendar weeks.
  - Council Officers shall receive and review any complaints made within this period, evaluating these on a case-by-case basis and responding to the applicant with a decision within four calendar weeks from the Permit application date.
- Not interfere with all private and public connections, pipes, or other embedded infrastructure while undertaking nature strip modifications, including but not limited to:
  - o Telecommunications assets.
  - Water and/or gas authority assets.
- Not use plant species that are:
  - Sharp, thorny, or prickly.
  - o Poisonous, noxious, toxic, or irritating.
  - Weedy, as defined in the Catchment and Land Protection Act 1994.
  - Prohibited, as defined by Agriculture Victoria.
- Not interfere with Council's Street Trees Policy, which means:
  - Not planting any new trees in the nature strip.
  - o Not pruning, or otherwise modifying or damaging existing trees in the nature strip.
- Not use fruit, vegetables, herbs, or other plant species that are intended for human consumption.

#### Compliance

If Council is made aware that any nature strip plantings or modification pose a safety hazard, accessibility concern, or liability risk, Council will undertake reasonable endeavours to work with the relevant Permitholder to make adjustments to address the issue.

In situations where the above approach does not result in a satisfactory solution for both Council and the resident, Council may issue orders to comply and penalties under its *General Local Law 2018 (amendment)*.

#### Sale of property or moving house

Permit-holders selling their property must notify Council. Upon execution of the contract of sale, the

Permit will be cancelled. Council will contact the new owners of the property to issue a new Permit, if applicable.

Cancellation, granting of Permits, application status or any other matter referred to under this Policy does not waive, null or void any obligations under Council's *General Local Law 2018 (amendment)*.

#### Renters

Renters of a property may apply to hold a Nature Strip Planting Permit during their tenancy only.

In their application for a Permit, Renters must provide evidence of support from their landlord / property owner. This evidence of support must note that the landlord / property owner agrees to maintain or reinstate the nature strip in accordance with this Policy in the event it is not carried out by the renter during the renter's tenancy.

#### Existing (legacy) nature strip plantings

Existing nature strip modifications will be grandfathered under this Policy. However, all grandfathered nature strip modifications must still comply with Council's *General Local Law 2018 (amendment)*.

If a grandfathered nature strip modification poses a safety hazard, accessibility concern, or liability risk, Council will undertake reasonable endeavours to work with the relevant resident to make adjustments to address the issue. In situations where the above approach does not result in a satisfactory solution for both Council and the resident, Council may issue orders to comply and penalties under its *General Local Law 2018 (amendment)*.

#### Council, contractor, and third party services and works

Acts of planting on nature strips allowed by this Policy shall not contravene existing Victorian legislation, Council policies, procedures, and/or provision of services. These include, but are not limited to:

- Waste collection and management services.
- Street cleaning services.
- Street tree management, maintenance, removal, and/or new Council plantings.
- Traffic and parking management.
- Emergency services.
- Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and related mobility and accessibility requirements.
- Risk and public safety requirements.


Council, contractors, and other third-party services (e.g., water authorities, gas authorities, telecommunications authorities, electricity authorities, or other service authorities,) may, from time to time, require access to underground assets or nature strips for maintenance and repair works.

Inadvertent damage to nature strip planting or modifications may be caused during the course of these works. In the event this takes place, Council, contractors, and third parties are only required to reinstate the nature strip with grass and are not liable for any reinstatement costs incurred by the resident.

Core functions of Council, and any other activities applicable by law must continue as usual irrespective of the allowances provided by this Policy or associated Permits.

# Appeals, complaints and grievances

If a member of the City of Stonnington community is aggrieved by the application of this Policy and is unsatisfied with a decision made by Council, they may raise their concern in writing. The Manager Climate, Sustainability & City Greening will consider appeals, complaints and grievances on a case-by-case basis. Escalated matters will then be referred to a Senior Review Panel comprised of three senior executive officers from other Council departments.

#### **Definitions**

Before You Dig Australia	National organisation providing free pre-excavation services across Australia to prevent injury and reducing damage to the underground assets. Works in partnership with utilities, local councils, government agencies, and private enterprises.
Clearance Area	The area (0.3m) around assets and infrastructure located within or adjacent to nature strips which must be kept clear of obstructions and may only be planted with groundcovers.
Council	Refers to the City of Stonnington.

The area of public land between the boundary of private property and kerb, not including the paved footpath area or driveways. Council Officers may also make amendments to the list of related documents when reference material needs updating.
